








There are soo many possibilities..

The American sociologist Erik Olin Wright has divided these possibilities into three central strategies of change in order to provide orientation in political work and to develop concrete approaches

for change...



Radical Reforms - Transforming Institutions and Policies

Radical reforms means changing laws, rules and institutions step by step. These changes build on what exists today - while keeping the good life for all in mind. They are therefore a strategy that changes the system from within. The idea is that radical reforms are implemented "from above" by the state or fought for by social movements and parties over the state.



4 examples of radical reforms



set a 4-day week as normal working hours



Promote agricultural structural laws for a fair distribution of land



climate reparations payments for countries in the Global South

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socialize hospitals



Nowtopias: Building alternatives and testing the Good Life for All

In Nowtopias you can practice a more just and sustainable coexistence on a small scale - in terms of new practices, institutions or organizational forms. Nowtopias are places, spaces or groups in which transformation is driven from below. They arise within the existing system and despite its structures - often in niches - and they give a foretaste of the Good Life for All.



4 examples of Nowtopias



organize a reading group



participate in community supported agriculture



join a renewable energy cooperative




organize a solidarity event

resist & build counter-power



Resisting and building counter-power means opposing something that is judged to be unjust or unsustainable. This involves seeking direct confrontation with institutions and social structures. This can be done in a variety of ways, including through organized strikes that disrupt unjust or destructive activities while drawing attention to these

injustices.



4 examples of resistance and building counter-power:



Start a creative protest performance



Participate in a strike



Co-organize a demonstration



Telling different stories
